

Suggested Colinism commandments include: "Thou shalt be spanked and thou shall enjoy it' and "Thou shalt not dream of another lesser

man," suggested by new recruit to Colinism, Erin.

Another posted a mantra that read: "When I pass a white vest in the stores, I will imagine [Colin] in it, and pant. I will attend every single one of Colin's comedy gigs, even if it is in Tweebuffelsmeteenskootmorsdoodgeskietfontein.'

Marriage proposals are regularly posted on the website. One reads: "Colin will you marry me? Those dark eyes, that gorgeous smile, the fabulous personality . . . Colin, I love you. You are the best presenter; cute, funny, clever and damn hot.

"With all the love in the world. Your future wife AKA Tarryn. PS: you can choose our honeymoon destination and our kids'

Moss is one of the most popular celebrities in the history of local TV. A women's magazine has bestowed the title of SA's

Sexiest Man upon him. Versatile Moss is also a stand-up comedian and soapie actor. He starred in *Isidingo* before presenting Fear Factor and then Idols, with Letoya Makhene.

He recently received a nomination at the Sunday Awards in the most stylish male magazine entertainment show host category, while readers of the magazine Entertainment Africa voted him "most edible" local TV star.

Moss has taken a tongue-in-cheek approach to his sacrilegious young followers.

EIA RECORD OF DECISION

In terms of section 22 (3) of the Environment Conservation Act, 1989 (Act No. 73 of 1989) and sections 9 and 10 of the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Regulations (R1183 of 5 September 1997), the Department of Environmental Affairs and Tourism (DEAT) has authorized the construction and upgrading of some sections of National Road 1 (N1) and the construction of toll plazas between the R300 and Sandhills, Western Cape and on the National Road 2 (N2), Western Cape, the construction of a new alignment through Helderberg, construction and upgrading of portions of the road, and the construction of toll plazas between the R300 and Bot River. The authorization is subject to the conditions listed in the Record of Decision (ROD).

In terms of section 35 (3) of the Act and section 11 of the EIA Regulations, any appeals against the issuing of the authorization must be made in writing directly to the Minister of Environmental Affairs and Tourism within 30 days from the date on which the Record of Decision was issued to the applicant (30 September 2003) using the contact details indicated below

An appeal must set out all the facts as well as the grounds of appeal, and must be accompanied by all relevant documents or copies of them, which are certified as true by a commissioner of oaths. Any appeals must reach the Minister by 30 October 2003. A signed and certified appeal questionnaire must accompany all appeals. This questionnaire is obtainable from the department at tel. 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Kwaito star in another car crash

KWAITO superstar Tokollo Tshabalala last Saturday survived another horrific car crash — this time in Soweto.

Tshabalala made headlines three years ago when a car he was travelling in crashed and killed a Botswana woman. He sustained serious injuries to his head.

This week, Tshabalala is nursing a broken femur in his right leg and is walking on crutches.
